

SCHOLARLY PROJECT OPTIONS

Description

This is an opportunity to work with a GW faculty member on a project of your choosing. The Intersession IV Scholarly Project and your Scholarly Concentration Scholarly Project **can be the same project**, but to do so, it must be *closely* and *clearly* related to your Scholarly Concentration. You can link this to ongoing projects or tie in prior work. For the Population Health Summit deliverable, you are required to develop a Population Health Proposal which asks you to take a deeper dive into a population health aspect of your project.

Scholarly Project Options

If in the **Clinical Practice Innovation & Entrepreneurship, Community/Urban Health, Disaster Medicine, Global Health, Health Policy, Medical Education & Leadership or Medical Humanities**

Scholarly Concentration your options include:

- Scholarly literature review in your SC area +
- Primary IRB-approved research connected to your SC area +
- Case report and review of the literature in your SC area+
- Educational research or curricular innovation in your SC area+
- Developing a community service project or program in your SC area+
- An oral or poster presentation of a primary research project at a national or international meeting where the student is an author, and associated abstract
- A research poster that has been presented at GW SMHS or CNHS Research as an MS4 (this is separate from any poster presented at Research Day as an MS2), and associated abstract
- A peer reviewed research paper in a professional journal (submitted manuscripts, and manuscripts in progress are acceptable *)
- Another option that has been discussed and approved by your SC Director. Please submit approval email from SC Director with this submission.

Scholarly Project Options Continued

If in the **Clinical Translational Research Scholarly Concentration** your options include:

- A peer-reviewed research paper in a professional journal (submitted manuscripts, and manuscripts in progress are acceptable *)
- An oral or poster presentation of a primary research project at a national or international meeting where the student is an author
- A research poster that has been presented at GW SMHS or CNHS Research as an MS4 (this is separate from any poster presented at Research Day as an MS2), and associated abstract
- A published or publishable systematic review of a specific clinical disorder or research methodology
- A scholarly report on a case series or small group of similar cases including at least 5 patients, with a detailed literature review

Scholarly Project Requirements

+ Written paper, minimum 15 pages (not including references), 12-point font, double-spaced, professional format and citation style (JAMA, APA)

* Submitted manuscripts or manuscripts in progress should follow journal submission guidelines, and must be approved by faculty advisors as they are not held to a page count
